

From the Principal

Dear Families,

As we bring you our last newsletter for the year, it provides a great opportunity to reflect on the past year and also flag a few upcoming events. What a year it has been, with so many fabulous opportunities for our student to learn, connect and grow. The highlights for me have definitely been continuing to get to know the students, spending time in the classrooms, and observing the students engaging in deep learning. There have been a number of curriculum and learning reforms this year where we have worked with the Literacy Guarantee Unit and other curriculum leads to focus on changing our approach to reading and spelling in our Junior School and also focusing on high impact teaching strategies in maths in the Middle Years. Staff have an ongoing commitment to their own learning and professional development and we certainly value the time we can come together to focus on this and then embed our learning back in the classroom.

Another school priority has been our data focus where we are investigating the information from the range of assessments students complete, to ensure we are using this to inform our teaching and learning. Again we have worked with specialist staff from the department during our student free days and staff meetings. Our plan for our upcoming student free day on Friday 1st December, is to continue our data focus to work together to review student achievements and results, and also set our directions for 2024. We will also provide time for 'handover' and a deep dive into the learning needs of individual students in order to support a positive transition and learning success in 2024.

We are currently working on class placements for next year and will hopefully be able to communicate this information to families before the end of the year. Starting in a new class is certainly an exciting time, but for some students (and parents), it can be an anxious time.

Here are a few tips to support this transition:

- Set up some play times with children from the new class over the holidays to help develop some new friendships
- Talk through any issues or fears your child might have whether these are about friends, grades or teachers. Instead of focusing on the 'what ifs', try and steer them towards 'what is'...and what they can do to change the situation to support a growth mindset and resilience

OPERATION FLINDERS

In August, year 12 student Tanaya Kemp, travelled to Papua New Guinea with some of the Operation Flinders team, to complete the Kokoda track.

In this first photo you can see the team standing under one of the wings, of the twin otter plane that flew them from Port Moresby airfield to the Kokoda Village Air strip. When the team arrived in the village of Kokoda, they were greeted by many of the village children and families who were very excited to meet new people.

The group spent some time at the Kokoda war memorial and met the porter team before taking some photos under the Kokoda track arches, and then starting their journey.

The track had lots of challenges including a very wet and humid first few days, some very steep inclines and declines of mountains, and also some psychological challenges that come with trekking such a hard track.

On day 4 the team arrived at the village of Abuari, which is home to many of their porters. The team were greeted by the village children, who presented them with flower necklaces as well as a fresh fruit feast. The team were fortunate enough to be hosted at Abuari for the whole of day 5, meaning they were able to visit the school, get to know some of the children and families, as well as play some games with the village people.

The group visited many historical sites across the Kokoda track, whilst learning about some of the important history which took place in these spots. At the Isurava battle site camp, the team read plaques about the history of the site, and also did some self-reflection in front of the four memorial stones. The stones were engraved with four phrases, Courage, Endurance, Mate-ship, and Sacrifice. These four phrases are very important and sentimental as they are some of the aspects needed and shown within strong individuals.


